Sixth Grade — Camby Compton joined the class. At the end of the year we took a trip to St. Louis. We all passed the sixth grade and were ready for the seventh.

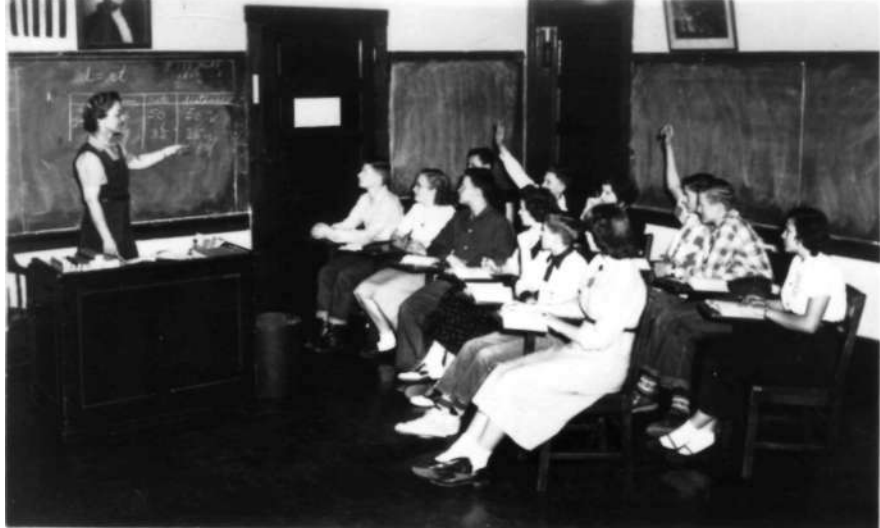
Seventh Grade — Sue Robertson and Nelma Wilson moved away. Patrick Costello joined the class.

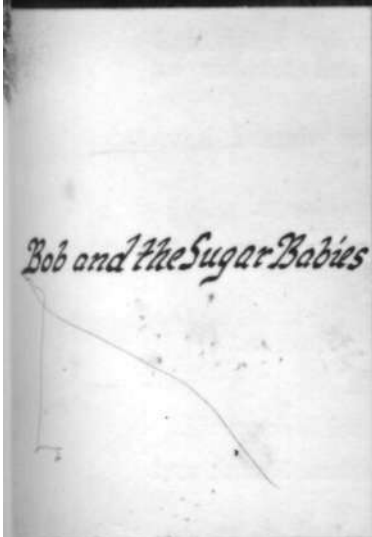
## Chapter Eight.

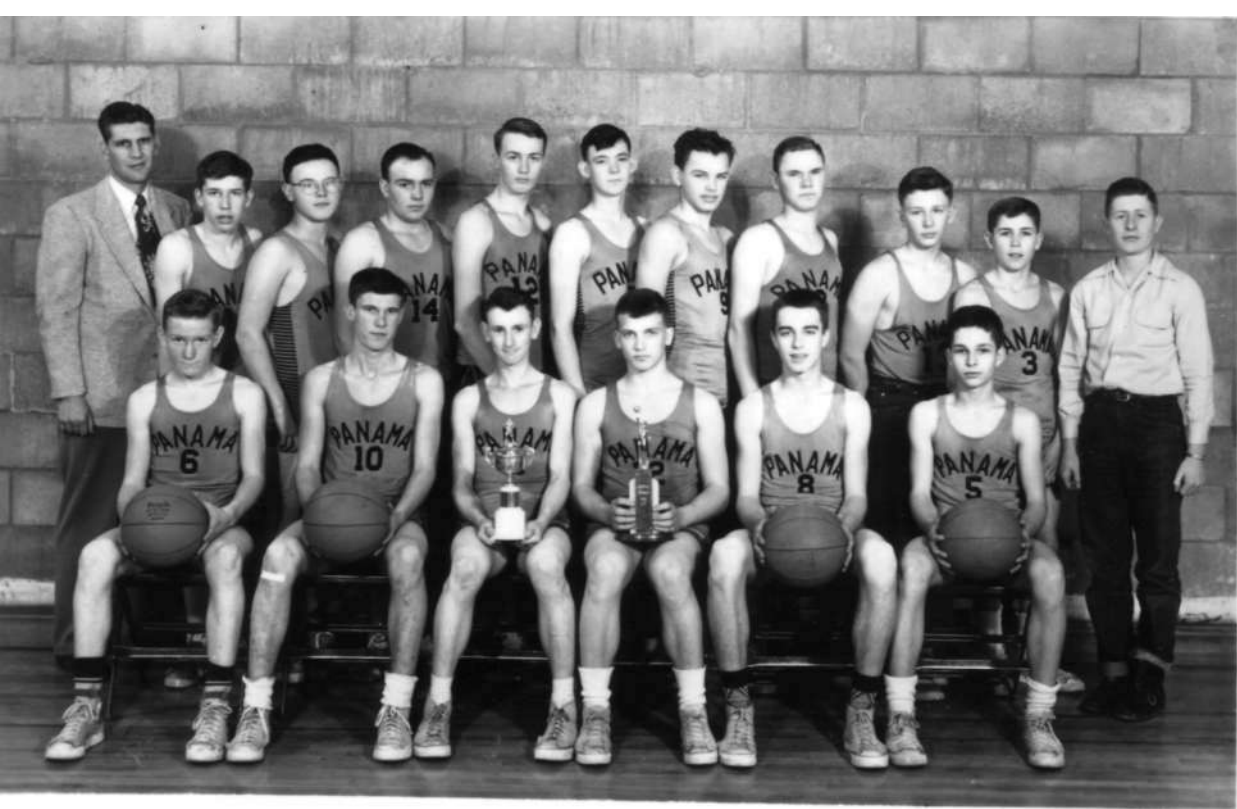
